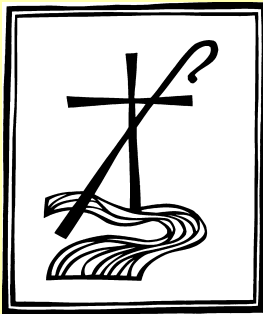

Dear Friends in Christ,

"As we now enter into the contemplation of the passion of our Lord Jesus Christ and meditate on the salvation of the world through his sufferings, death, burial and resurrection, let us pray..."
 ~ Introduction to the Prayer of the Day for Palm/Passion Sunday, ELW

Have you ever wondered why we Lutherans, along with many other flavors of Christians, spend so much time in worship the week leading up to Easter? To those who look at our schedule from the outside (and look at the pastor's over-long to do list!) this whole thing we call Holy Week must seem crazy. In the course of eight days, we will have nine opportunities to worship, with seven of the nine happening in just four days! It is a logistical nightmare, a parish secretary's headache, and a liturgist's dream. Yet for us, it's all worth it.

Holy Week is more than just an opportunity for worship. During this most holy of weeks we are invited to *enter into* these things. We are not just observers, remembering things that have been told from one generation to another. We are more than passive recipients of this great drama; we are brought into the midst of God's story. Throughout the course of one week we experience the full range of human emotion, and we are changed by God's powerful encounter with humanity.

The journey begins with triumph and expectation, with shouts of praise and hope for the entering king. We cry, "Hosanna!" We look forward to all that is to come. From this joy and excitement we move to a quiet upper room, where we encounter Jesus in a new way. The master becomes the slave, as Jesus teaches us a new way to love one another through the humble act of footwashing. We are fed and nourished by a meal of the community, as we tell one another, "The body of Christ, given for you." We pray with Jesus in the garden, struggling to stay awake, and we witness his humiliation at the hands of his captors as we watch our beautiful altar stripped bare and empty. We are invited to walk through the hours of Good Friday, praying through the ten stations that trace his journey from trial to tomb. We receive the empty, rugged cross, and are asked to embrace this instrument of torture and death as a symbol of life. We return Saturday as the sun sets, to strike the new fire of hope, confident that the light of Christ will shatter even the darkest night. As we wait to hear the great proclamation of Easter, we share old family stories, of how God remained faithful, even when we could not. As Easter morning dawns, we ring our Easter bells to welcome the return of the "A—elua!" and we are drenched with the waters of baptism, immersed in God's unending love and forgiveness.

In the span of just eight days we move through a cycle from life to death to life once more. I invite you to enter into this journey. Don't just watch. Come. See and hear, taste and touch, smell and sing. Come, be Easter people. See you in worship.

LENTEN JOURNEY: 40 DAYS WITH THE LORD'S PRAYER

This year, you are invited to join with others at Good Shepherd to spend the 40 days of Lent on a journey together. We are continuing to walk through the Lord's Prayer, spending time each day and each week reflecting on these words that are a central part of our life together. We are using a book from the new Book of Faith series of materials, which is available for \$8 in the church office. The book provides a devotion, including scripture, prayers, thoughts to consider and suggestions for journaling, along with the author's reflection for the day.

COMMITTEE NIGHT

In an effort to encourage greater participation in the various committees/teams of Good Shepherd, we are going to try a common committee night – an evening once a month when most of the committees will meet at the same time. - People can more easily find a committee meeting.
- People can easily visit different committees to find the right fit.
- People can carpool to meetings even if they are not on the same committee. This could be especially helpful for members who do not drive at night.
- Members can more easily collaborate on projects, increasing communication among committees. Instead of waiting for a few weeks for another committee to meet, they could interact and share ideas and plans that evening.
- People can enjoy fellowship along with committee work.

Whether or not you are already on a committee, please consider coming out to see what the committees/teams are doing. The common committee nights are scheduled for Wednesday, April 27th and Wednesday, May 25th. After the May committee night, we will decide whether or not to implement once-a-month Common Committee Nights for Fall 2011.

Super Stars and Students Succeed!

Fifty years of ministry continues as eight teams representing Lutheran Churches in New Castle County participated in this year's 26th annual Super Stars Competition benefiting the Hilltop Lutheran Neighborhood Center. When the dust cleared, St. Phillip's team took home the trophy for the second year in a row. More importantly, the event raised over \$6,000 for the children of the Hilltop area of Wilmington. Thanks to everyone who participated and made this year's event a success.

Also in March, with the theme "Education is the Key," the Hilltop Center won a competitive bid to provide tutoring services for high school students from three Red Clay School District high schools. Hilltop will receive a \$24,000 grant from the district plus forty computers to provide an alternative educational setting for students with learning issues during the school day and/or after school. The Center provides the instructor. The program, which runs until June, may be extended beyond this school year.

As the number of students attending the Hilltop Center continues to grow, so too do their needs. There is a great need for volunteers at the Center with experience in sewing, cooking, arts and crafts, motivational speaking for teens, SAT preparation, and social/behavior management. If you have a talent for or experience in any of these areas, please contact the center at 656-3224. Your help will be greatly appreciated.

On March 6, we committed to an act of service or to do something to deepen our spiritual lives during the Lenten Season. Together, we can grow in faith and love and truly accomplish God's work with our hands.

Stewardship is recognizing the gifts we have been given: our time, talents, treasures and the earth's resources. We are each on our spiritual journeys to being the faithful stewards that God calls us to be. We each need to ask ourselves, "How is God calling me to respond?"

We are mid-way through the Lenten Season. How are you doing with your commitments? Having trouble sticking to your commitments? Turn those over to God in prayer.

STEWARDSHIP

It is not too late to make a commitment if you have not already done so. Here is a list of opportunities.

Acts of Service

Volunteer with Family Promise- serve a meal, be an overnight host, drive the van, help with set-up and take-down. Sign up on the Family Promise bulletin board.

Become an LCS food bank volunteer- tour the LCS food bank at St. Stephen's in Wilmington and learn more about how to become a volunteer.

Assemble Kits for Lutheran World Relief- purchase basic supplies (towels, personal care items, school supplies, etc) for health kits, school kits or newborn kits (used to be called midwife kits). Bring your completed kits to Good Shepherd, and we can send them on for distribution throughout the world.

Set aside money each day to donate to the ELCA World Hunger Appeal- perhaps it is the cost of your morning latte or the price of a lunch out each week. Or save your spare change from the end of the day. Small amounts each day can make a big difference. At the end of Lent, on Easter Sunday April 24th, bring your savings to Good Shepherd and donate it in the World Hunger jar.

Serve in your neighborhood- pick up trash at a local playground, help an elderly neighbor with spring cleaning, offer to walk a friend's dog. There are many possibilities for service right outside our doors.

Donate, prepare or serve food for Emmanuel Dining Room- Good Shepherd prepares a lasagna dinner on the 9th of each month and serves the meal on the 10th. Sign up on the bulletin board in the narthex

Consider becoming a worship helper- acolytes, assisting ministers, lectors (readers), communion assistants, ushers, greeters and members of the altar guild are all vital parts of our life as a gathered community on Sunday morning. Just mark your interest on the Count Me In form or speak to Pastor Kathy to learn more.

Spirituality

Participate in the Lenten Journey: 40 Days with the Lord's Prayer daily devotions- copies are available in the church office for \$8 each. This book offers daily reflections, scripture, journaling suggestions and prayers based on the words of the Lord's Prayer.

Join a Small Group to discuss the Lenten Journey devotions- sign up on the bulletin board by the nursery to join a group to meet weekly to reflect on the readings and grow in community.

Join the Monday Night Bible Study to discuss Paul's Letter to the Romans- this group meets Monday evenings at 7:30 p.m. in Room 12 for lively discussion of biblical passages.

Attend the Women's Retreat in Ocean City April 8-10th- Join others as we explore various spiritual practices, enjoy worship on the beach and foster new friendships with other women in the congregation. Sign up on the Count Me In form or on the bulletin board.

Take on a new prayer practice- commit to pray each day at a certain time, either on your own or with others. Consider visiting the prayer labyrinth on the grounds of the Delaware Art Museum (www.delart.org for more information).

Establish a family ritual of blessing- commit to offering a blessing to your children when you say goodbye each morning. Bless each other by making the sign of the cross on each other's forehead and saying, "Remember you are loved. God is with you this day." Or come up with your own words of blessing to use at a special time each day.

Reconnect with old friends and relatives - offer them words of greeting and love. Call, send a note in the mail or send an e-mail. Then pray for them and give thanks to God for the many relationships in your life.

- Our first common Committee Night will be held on April 27 at 7pm.
